





During the COVID-19 pandemic, psychologists largely moved to online platforms for telehealth, but their electronic health records (HER) are not necessarily following suit.

However, sharing electronic records can risk clients' privacy and confidentiality (Filbin, 2021; Richards, 2009). There are several legal and ethical considerations to keep in





As of 2021, psychiatric hospitals were using EHRs at a 46% rate, compared to their general medicine and surgical practice peers who use EHRs at a 96% rate (Filbin, 2021). One advantage of moving to EMR is that it can improve the interdisciplinary intersections of health, easily transferring records to other providers (Filbin, 2021).





• School districts must provide parents a listing each of the health services and mental health services related to human sexuality, contraception, or family planning available at the student's school and of the parents' right to withhold

We have been actively opposing a number of bills, including those that are discriminatory to the LGBTQIA+ community, and some have passed, including SB 150 with the language of HB 470 included in the final draft.
